Jeremiah 31:31,33, 34


“For I will forgive their iniquity and remember their sin no more.” What an extraordinary gift! *God forgives*. That’s a tremendous blessing. Forgiveness is one gift that no amount of money can buy and no amount of good deeds can earn. It is entirely free, and God gladly gives it freely.

But also, God forgets! It means that God is *not* all-knowing. Some things God chooses to *not* remember. There is the trite saying, “forgive and forget.” With great effort and generous love we might forgive. But to forget a wrong is nearly impossible. Our hurts seem to always linger in our memory and rise up when we are affronted or threatened.

But God *forgets*. The sin you remember with regret, God has forgotten. The guilt you carry is needless for God has forgotten. Your baptism is your personal promise that God has forgotten your sin. Your baptism is the mark upon you that God *promises* you forgiveness.

This is the new covenant. It’s pure gift. It’s a change of heart by the One who loves unconditionally and forgives so completely that even God’s memory is erased.




Blessed To Be a Blessing: LNL Lent 2020

We at Lake Nokomis Lutheran are blessed in countless ways. Our church community is one place that we acknowledge, celebrate, and share those blessings. This Lent, we’re going to be part of the ELCA’s Generosity Project: an “intergenerational, household-focused approach to stewardship. Its goals are to connect generations, create centers for the faith practice of generosity, and grow in God’s grace generation to generation.” (from the ELCA website) We’ll spend our 9:00 Education Hour on Sundays in these intergenerational events, about which you’ll hear much from Erica and Pastor Chris. The worship that we share during the season will reflect our “Blessed To Be a Blessing” theme, which ties in with the Sunday Gospel readings and with the Generosity Project itself. On Wednesday evenings between March 1 and April 1, we’ll share Holden Evening Prayer at 7 pm, with meditations based on the teachings of Mother Theresa of Calcutta and the Rev Dr Martin Luther King, Jr. Our Ash Wednesday observance will be shared with our partner congregations at Hope Lutheran at 7 pm. There will be a combined choir (6 pm rehearsal) and the imposition of ashes. Holy Week (April 5-11) will also be a shared experience, with Maundy Thursday at LNL at 7 pm, including First Communion for our 5th graders, as well as prayer/healing stations. Interim Update 2020 March

LNL partnership with Living Table UCC and now Spirit of St. Stephen's Catholic Community has been discussed for some time. Details of *how* this might work are still being sketched out, and most likely will be brought to our congregation for discussion in April. *Why* a partnership would be good for LNL is what I present here.

1. We confess in the Apostles' Creed "I believe in the Holy Spirit, the holy catholic (universal church)..." God's Holy Spirit comes as community, where two or three are gathered in Christ's name. But we do *not* confess, "I believe in the Holy Spirit, Lake Nokomis Lutheran Church..." Our confessional identity depends on recognition of our connections beyond our members. We are not a church unto ourselves, independent of others, dependent only on our own efforts. We are connected in one universal church that includes Living Table and Spirit of St. Stephen's.

2. Growing membership through attraction no longer works. Potential members will not come here just because we offer fantastic fellowship and spiritual experiences. Unchurched people these days are just not motivated on their own to come. Matthew 28:19-20 and John 17:18 clearly state that the church is a *sent church*, that is, our missional activity is to go out into our neighborhoods to be the kingdom of God. Not bring them to our church building, but bring church to the neighbor. Not attraction, but service. Partnership will give us additional ways of being the kingdom of God beyond ourselves.

3. In this current time of division and suspicion, three churches working in partnership will demonstrate cooperation, mutual support and respect for differences. This partnership will give insights to other places in society of how to overcome suspicion and instead see commonality. We have a role in society of leading the way toward healing and goodwill.

4. And there are financial and moral reasons to do this. It can be argued that it is a moral issue to partner so as to free up funds for direct ministry, that sharing building costs will free up money for programs that directly serve people.

Partnering with Living Table and Spirit of St. Stephen's has other good reasons as well: the joy of working closely with others, drawing on the strengths of each other, additional volunteers for programs, and so on.

Send a Message to Legislators about Home

On the first two Sundays in March you will have an opportunity to help your community by letting your legislators know that you want to end homelessness.

The Beacon Interfaith Housing Collaborative, of which Lake Nokomis Lutheran is a member, will provide postcards to send to your legislators. We will have a table in the narthex where you can complete a postcard to your legislators, sending the message that you want a strong and healthy community where all people have a home.

This year Beacon is working on three initiatives.

First, we are asking the legislature to allot \$500 million in Housing Bonds in the 2020 state legislative session.

Second, we are looking to fill a gap in public funding to operate family supportive housing with services like mental health and job counseling.

Third, we want to invest in a rent subsidy program that ensures that low-income households pay no more than 30 percent of their income for housing.

This all can be achieved if we let government leaders know that this is a priority for us. Let's band together with other faith communities to "seek justice, love mercy, and walk humbly with God."

Summer Trip Registration Deadlines! Wilderness Canoe Base Boundary Waters

Trips: A signup sheet with cost details is located in the narthex on the blue bulletin board.

Registration deadline is March 15.

Island Camp, July 12-17: Great for all ages. You stay in cabins at Wilderness, with multiple options including day trips into the Boundary Waters, rock climbing, swimming, campfires, worship, crafts, hikes, and more. You can stay all or part of the week.

Canoe Trip, July 12-17: This option is for those currently 4th grade or older (children younger than 6th grade must be with parent/guardian). You'll stay at Wilderness on Sunday night, and then spend the rest of the week out on train in the Boundary Waters, where you'll paddle and portage through the day and sleep in tents at night. A fantastic opportunity for team building and immersing yourself in God's creation.

(Wapo) & Ox Lake: Sign up on the blue bulletin board in the narthex. **Online registration deadline is March 15.**

Seeds Weekend July 31-August 2: Current 1st -3rd grade youth get their first taste of camping during Seeds, where they will experience music, Bible study, campfires, crafts, water activities and games.

Youth Camp, August 2-7: Current 4-8th grade youth attend Wapo for a week that includes Bible study, worship, cabin activities, field games, swimming, arts & crafts, campfires, games, friends and more!


